

Project Description



Project 1302 West Village Pied-à-terre

A pied-à-terre for a Client who lives abroad is defined by night and day, as represented in the materials of the apartment's two main, generous spaces. The extensive cabinetry and paneling throughout—a blonde wood public space is paralleled with a blackstained wood bedroom—is not only symbolic of the activities of the rooms, or the times of their use. The millwork is used to create storage, hide elements such as air-conditioning units, and transform part of the daytime space from dining room to active kitchen.

Though streamlined in execution, details of the space echo New York's historic, elegant apartments: an angular, modern reinterpretation of the plaster cornice sits atop the flush wood

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paneling, which has a built-in picturehanging rail at top, so artwork can be hung throughout. The wood flooring, composed of both the dark and light wood of the walls, runs throughout, using parquetry to create pattern at a mega scale.

The two main spaces, though in dialogue with one another, do not touch: deep passages lined in dark lacquer act as gaskets between the different areas and at entries: into the apartment, between its two main spaces, and out onto the apartment's exterior terrace.


An almost entirely white bathroom inverts the apartment's use of materials: natural wood strips create a cornice line and ceiling, bringing warmth to the space.













Living Room Elevations








Living Room Elevation

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
Living Room Elevation




Kitchenette

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





Bedroom Elevations

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
















Bathroom Elevations

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

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
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
