

Project Description



Project 0905 Arts Union Beacon

A beacon for the city of Somerville, Massachusetts' historic firehouse aims to give identity to Union Square and the city beyond. A replacement for the building's cupola, long-since demolished, ABA's design of eight curved, extruded shells suggests the arched openings of the original, making solid form of the historical voids.

Surfaced in brushed stainless steel, these shells glow from within when they receive illumination from below. With the remaining cupola structure rendered invisible, the beacon is a kind of ethereal remnant of the tower's past. A rounded, gentle, but bright light emerges from within the shells, stopping sharply at their edges. The dark, vertical voids formed in between reference the columns that once held up the cupola's roof.

The forms will be fabricated from water-jet cut brushed stainless steel sheets, which will then be folded and bolted together. Once hoisted onto the roof and affixed to the base framework, the shells will be fitted with an energyefficient LED lighting system. The lights will be programmed to change color in coordination with events in Somerville's Union Square, furthering the symbol of the beacon as a communication tool.



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



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





Variable Color performance with LED lighting technology















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The Beacon as backdrop to Union Square





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


Seasonal programming at Union Square

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
